## Message from the Administrator

Fiscal Year 2013 was a very busy year as it relates to the Regional Transit Authorities program and the Commonwealth's various initiatives. Between finishing the Beyond Boston study, the Governor's 530 Commission, and the potential consolidation of human service transportation into one broker, there were many issues which kept the Regional Transit Authorities busy at the State House.

Needless to say, one of the most important initiatives was the Transportation Refinancing Bill which was put forth by the governor and debated and finally voted on in July of 2013. The new transportation finance package will ensure the Regional Transit Authorities' state budget line item is prospectively financed in FY2014. Additional state operating funds will help expand transit services in the regions.

GATRA was also busy purchasing new vehicles for the mass transit fleet as well as undertaking several construction projects and beginning the design of the new Plymouth Transportation Center in preparation for the Country's 400th celebration.

## CAPITAL PROJECTS

Construction of Attleboro Intermodal Transportation Center Starts in FY 2013



### Attleboro Intermodal Transportation Center

Construction of the Attleboro Intermodal Transportation Center (AITC) officially began in August 2012 with a ceremonial groundbreaking attended by several state and local officials including Lt. Gov. Tim Murray, U.S. Rep. James McGovern, and Attleboro Mayor Kevin Dumas.



Actual construction began in early spring with the re-alignment of Wall Street which now allows for improved access to the commuter rail station and parking.

In June 2013, steel beams were placed for the new bus station followed by the construction of four roofed bus berths with canopies.



Once completed in the fall 2013, the AITC will become the Attleboro system hub where all inbound and outbound buses will meet.

#### Other major highlights of FY 2013 include:

- > Plymouth Transportation Center GATRA, in cooperation with the Plymouth Growth and Development Corporation (PGDC), and the Town of Plymouth completes a site selection and feasibility study for developing a new transportation center in down Plymouth. The study's recommendations include the construction of an enclosed waiting area, sheltered bus berths, and approximately 300 new parking spaces. In January 2013, a RFP went out for the design and construction of the new facility. Fennick/McCredie Architects were hired to complete preliminary/conceptual design of the new facility. The preliminary design is expected to be completed by spring 2014.
- > MAP -21 On July 6, 2012, President Obama signs a two-year bill (MAP-21) authorizing additional funding for federal transportation programs. As a result of the bill, transit programs are projected to increase slightly to \$10.578 billion in FY 2013 and \$10.695 billion in FY 2014.
- > **Performance Measurements** As part of the new MAP -21 guidelines, the state implements a comprehensive performance measurement system with the objective of improving the overall service of the state's public transit system. Both fixed route and Dial-a-Ride services are measured using Passengers Per Revenue Mile (PPRM), Passengers Per Revenue Hour (PPRH), Revenue Miles Between Preventable Accidents, and Miles Between Road Calls. - Ride Match GATRA's Mobility Management Department launches Ride Match in December 2012. The new web-based tool offers quick, easy access to vital information about transportation options for seniors, individuals with disabilities, and anyone needing transportation in Southeastern Massachusetts. Visit Ride Match at: www.massridematch.org.
- > New Travel Training Program In early spring 2013, GATRA unveils a new Travel Training Program that teaches individuals how to safely and independently ride public transportation systems in Attleboro, Taunton and other communities where GATRA operates fixed route buses. Travel Training can consist of several one-on-one sessions or group lessons.
- > Upgrades to Taunton Bus Station Continue In a continued effort to improve safety, comfort and energy efficiency for both riders and employees, GATRA completed the design and/or construction of several capital projects. Safety improvements included the construction of (2) new egress stairways, a new security camera system and the design of a fire sprinkler system at the terminal. A collaborative project with the Taunton Housing Authority resulted in the construction of a new walkway equipped with energy efficient lights and security cameras that now connects an 80 unit public housing complex and the bus terminal. As part of the ongoing modernization effort, icynene insulation was applied to the roof structure of the terminal building, a new HVAC system was designed and advertised for construction in the spring of 2014. Currently a new energy efficient heating system for the Taunton Maintenance facility is being designed.




#### **FINANCE**

#### **Financial Ratios**

"Working Capital" is the amount by which current assets exceed current liabilities. The Current Ratio, which compares current assets to current liabilities, is an indicator of the ability to pay current obiligations.

This decrease in "Liabilities to Net Postion" was caused primarily by an increase in the amount invested in capital assets included in the net position balance.

## LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS & RECOMMENDATIONS



#### **Comprehensive Planning:**

The Beyond Boston study, which looked at public transportation issues outside of the MBTA district was completed in FY 2013. The study had specific recommendations for future planning and ways to improve organization and delivery of service throughout the RTA network. There are several elements within the study that called for greater collaboration among the RTAs in evaluating current busing and demand response service as well as providing planning for new services. As outlined in the Transportation Finance Bill passed by the state legislature in FY 2013, all RTAs are required to complete a Comprehensive Regional Transit Plan. In early 2014, GATRA will host several public meetings and listening session throughout the 28 member communities with local employers, business associations, labor organizations, and most important, our transit riders.

#### **Proposed Legislation:**

There were numerous initiatives that were put forth through the state legislature in Fiscal Year 2013. From the long list of recommendations that resulted from the work of the Governor's E530 Commission and the major transportation financing reform legislation to the implementation of the Beyond Boston study for transit services outside of Boston, there was much for the Regional Transit Authorities to participate in and accomplish in FY 2013.

Thanks to the work of the RTA Legislative Caucus, the message of the Regional Transit Authorities has become clearer. All the Regional Transit Authorities agree that expanded service and additional funding is needed, but the issue of equity in how the funding is distributed both within the Boston region as well as throughout the Commonwealth also needs to be resolved. Moreover, many of the other initiatives which were put forth cannot be adequately implemented without the provision for new funding for the RTA program. The RTA Caucus has been a strong voice in the legislature; ensuring that the RTA program receives the recognition and resources to prospectively fund the RTA line item in the state budget, and to increase the line item with additional operating and capital funding, as needed, so that the RTAs can continue to meet coordination efforts.

The most serious development in FY 2013 was the release of an RFR by the Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) that called for the consolidation of its Human Service Transportation program into one statewide broker. This action by EOHHS was vehemently fought by the RTAs. Many believe that the consolidation is in direct conflict with the Governor's E530 recommendations, which call for regional coordination of services and more efficient use of vehicles locally. Whether it's human service transportation funded or public transit funded, coordination is most effective when it is done at the local level.
